will be served only on Ash Wednesday and Maundy Thursday.

Hearing others share their faith stories puts us in touch with our own faith journeys, and the stories we carry within us of our own faith development. I hope you will make attending Wednesday Lenten services a priority in your lives these next two months. The stories you hear may help you to deepen your relationship with God, and enrich your own faith story.

WORSHIP THEMES

Transfiguration of Our Lord (February 3)

Today's festival is a bridge between the Advent-Christmas-Epiphany cycle that comes to a close today and the Lent-Easter cycle that begins in several days. On the mount of transfiguration Jesus is revealed as God's beloved Son, echoing the words at his baptism. This vision of glory sustains us as Jesus faces his impending death in Jerusalem.

We turn this week to Ash Wednesday and our yearly baptismal journey from Lent to Easter. Some churches put aside the alleluia at the conclusion of today's liturgy. This word of joy will be omitted during the penitential season of Lent and will be sung again at Easter.

First Sunday in Lent (February 10)

Today's gospel tells of Jesus' temptation in the desert. His forty-day fast becomes the basis of our Lenten pilgrimage. In the early church Lent was a time of intense preparation for those to be baptized at the Easter Vigil. This catechetical focus on the meaning of faith is at the heart of our Lenten journey to the baptismal waters of Easter. Hungry for God's mercy, we receive the bread of life to nourish us for the days ahead.

Second Sunday in Lent (February 17)

During Lent we journey with all those around the world who will be baptized at the Easter Vigil. In today's gospel Jesus tells Nicodemus that he must be born of water and Spirit. At the font we are given a new birth as daughters and sons of God. As God made a covenant with Abraham, in baptism God promises to raise us up with Christ to new life. From worship we are sent forth to proclaim God's love for the all the world.

Third Sunday in Lent (February 24)

In today's gospel the Samaritan woman asks Jesus for water, an image of our thirst for God. Jesus offers living water, a sign of God's grace flowing from the waters of baptism. The early church used this gospel and those of the next two Sundays to deepen baptismal reflection during the final days of preparation before baptism at Easter. As we journey to the resurrection feast, Christ comes among us in word, bath, and meal - offering us the life-giving water of God's mercy and forgiveness.

Council Update

The first meeting of year started off with Pastor Eichhorn leading the members in a moment of silence so the members could collect our thoughts, slow down and prepare ourselves to do Gods work. Pastor lead the members in the reading of Psalm 27:1, 4-9.

Council then welcomed the four new members to council; **Nancy Henry, Sonia Davila, Michelle Jackson-Haun and Wes Boord.**

Second order of business was to elect the nominations for Chair of Council; Doug Hammer, Chair Elect; Jim Worley and Secretary; Sue Longo. A vote was taken and the council approved these new leaders.

Donna Gorrell, our financial secretary gave her year-end report. It was noted that undesignated offering were up \$58,082 over last year. Don Hartman gave his year-end report and was pleased to announce we ended the year in the black with \$18,684.95 surplus, or just \$612.00 under our 2007 budget of \$508,800. Don Hartman asked for council's approval to be able to prepay at his discretion on the HVAC loan when extra funds were available. Council voted and approved his request.

The major item on the agenda was reviewing and approving the budget to present to the members at our annual congregational meeting. Dave Dickerson from Finance committee presented the budget that had been worked on by council over the last couple of months. After a lively discussion and spirited debate, council finalized and approved a balanced

budget for 2008. A copy of the budget will be mailed out to all members. Copies of the budget will also be available in the church office and at the meeting. Remember the **February 3** annual meeting will be a catered luncheon; you will not have to bring a side dish. I encourage all members to attend.

Nancy Henry, one of our new council members and who serves on the Benevolence committee, brought up the request from Christ Lutheran Church for \$8,000. This request is broken down to \$5,000 for pastoral salary which benevolence approved. The other three thousand dollars are requested for computer upgrade, meal program and after school boy's ministry. Council agreed these were a good use of the funds and approved bringing this item up at the February 3 meeting for congregational vote.

Jim Worley reminded council of the first Evangelism social event, "**Hearts for the Lord's Will**" on **January 27, 2008.**

Property committee advised us that work has begun on the restoration of the windows and wood above the back doors to the parish house.

Pastor Eichhorn brought to council attention that Trinity Lutheran Seminary has a student requesting a local internship. LCOS has had interns in the past and council felt we should consider it in the future. Internships normally start in the fall and run for one year.

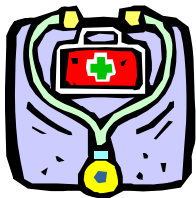

HEALTH MINISTRY NEWS

In my work with couples who are planning to celebrate their marriage at Lutheran Church of Our Savior, one of the things we talk about is the myth of a healthy marriage being a 50-50 proposition between a man and a woman. That only leads to “list-making”, keeping track of what the other person is or isn’t doing that is in her/his half of the relationship. And, we all know that this type of list-making only leads to hurt feelings, disillusionment, anger and frustration when we discover that we are doing more than our “fair share”. Rather, the model we lift up is that which was championed by Jesus – giving 100% without keeping track of what the other does. That is the mark of God’s love, and is how we are called to relate to one another.

In other words, we are called to be engaged in random acts of kindness, not in “paying back” someone for what they have done for us, but purely as a gesture of Christian love, without any expectation of receiving something in return. Just to help another, because that’s God’s call to us.

Helping others with no strings attached is a tremendously liberating experience. No waiting for a thank you, no waiting for a “pay back”, no frustration and anger if our acts are not reciprocated. Helping others in Christian love means we are able to live as we were created to live. And when we can do that, our lives become much more meaningful, and we definitely have more fun, and are more fun to be around!

SR. HIGH YOUTH MISSION TRIP

This summer, the senior high youth are planning to share their God-given talents and gifts with the 150 children and youth who live in the Christian orphanage Nuestrros Pequenos Hermanos (NPH), in the Dominican Republic. Shelly Fulcher, one of the LCOS adults who voluntarily works with our youth, has an uncle who serves as a missionary on this island nation in the Caribbean, and his connection with NPH piqued the interest of our youth. NPH is located in the San Pedro de Macoris province, on the southeast coast of the island. While at the orphanage, our youth will be doing some light construction work, as well as working with the children. So as to not tax NPH’s resources, our youth will be housed off-site, but staff at the orphanage will provide transportation.

Over the years, our youth have shared their gifts with others on mission trips to the Appalachian areas of New England and West Virginia, inner-city Chicago, northern Ohio, and even rehabbing the home of an LCOS member. After attending last summer’s ELCA Global Mission Event, in Columbus, Ohio, our youth were inspired to “think globally” in their efforts to serve God’s people. As they work to raise the money for this mission trip, you are invited to support these young “missionaries” with your donations and your prayers.
