## Pastor's Message

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,  
**T**he small wooden barrel had once been a container for salt water taffy; that's the way that mouth watering confection was once packaged and sold on the board walk in Ocean City, New Jersey. But for as long as I can remember, my grandparents used that old barrel to hold pennies that they saved throughout the year. And when school was out for the summer, and we moved to the Jersey shore to live with my grandparents for much of our summer vacation, that penny-filled barrel was waiting for us grandchildren to dump its contents on the living room floor and wrap the pennies. We were always amazed at the grand total, which was given to a different grandchild each summer, and was quickly spent on treasures excitedly purchased from our favorite places on the boardwalk.

For the next seven-plus months, the Youth Group is asking us to save our pennies and place them in the container in the narthex. However, instead of spending them on some "priceless" trinkets purchased at the mall or on-line, our youth will be sending them to Pennies for Peace, a not-for-profit organization established by

an American to build and outfit schools for boys and girls in Afghanistan and Pakistan (check out the website: [www.penniesforpeace.org](http://www.penniesforpeace.org)). Since education for women and girls in these countries is discouraged, this project has brought hope to a region that hasn't experienced much in recent years. Last year, American children donated more than 90 million pennies (over \$900,000), which provided educational supplies for children who would otherwise have gone without an education. Our youth have

## WORSHIP THEMES

### *November 1, All Saints Sunday*

Of all three years of the lectionary cycle, this year's All Saints readings have the most tears. Isaiah and Revelation look forward to the day when God will wipe away all tears; in John's gospel, Jesus weeps along with Mary and all the gathered mourners before he demonstrates his power over death. On All Saints Day we celebrate the victory won for all the faithful dead, but we grieve for our beloved dead as well, knowing that God honors our tears. We bring our grief to the table and find there a foretaste of Isaiah's feast to come.

### *November 8, Twenty-third Sunday after Pentecost*

Widows are visible everywhere in today's readings. Jesus denounces those scribes who pray impressive prayers but devour widows' houses. He commends the poor widow who in his view gave far more than the major donors. Jesus doesn't see her simply as an object of compassion or charity. She, like the widow of Zarephath who shares her last bit of food with Elijah, does something of great importance.

### *November 15, Twenty-fourth Sunday after Pentecost*

November begins with All Saints Day and ends in Advent, when we anticipate Christ's

coming again. So the readings today tell of the final resurrection and the end time. In the turmoil of hope, fear, and disbelief that these predictions provoke in us, Hebrews sounds a note of confident trust. Christ makes a way for us where there is no way, and we walk it confidently, our hearts and bodies washed in baptismal water, trusting the one who has promised. The more we see the last day approaching, the more important it is to meet together to provoke one another to love.

### *November 22, Christ the King*

Even after Israel had experienced the vagaries of kings, they still longed for a true king to set things right. He would have the king's title of Anointed One (Messiah); he would be the "one like a human being" (Son of Man) given dominion in Daniel's vision. Jesus is given these titles, even though he is nothing like an earthly king. His authority comes from the truth to which he bears witness, and those who recognize the truth voluntarily listen to him. We look forward to the day he is given dominion, knowing his victory will be the nonviolent victory of love.

### *November 29, First Sunday of Advent*

Advent is about the "coming days." God's people have always lived in great expectation, but that expectation finds specific, repeated enunciation in the texts appointed for these four weeks. The ancients anticipated a "righteous Branch to spring up for David." The Thessalonians awaited "the coming of our Lord Jesus with all the saints." Our Lord's contemporaries hoped for the time "to stand before the Son of Man." With them we eagerly await the coming days: another Christmas celebration, a second coming, and the advent of our Lord in word and supper.

## Council Update

Our meeting was called to order and Pastor Eichhorn lead the opening prayer. We did not have a quorum for our September meeting led by Vice Chair, Chris Becker. Therefore, we voted to accept the August minutes at this October meeting. During our financial review Don Anstaett announced that he is depositing money nightly and that the deposit slips will be mailed to the treasurer, Don Hartman. It was also reported that our church is currently operating at a deficit, however, we are optimistic and hopeful that the offerings will increase or at least continue coming in.

Our property committee has made a list of projects that need to be done. It was reported that many of the projects listed have already been committed to by volunteers within the church. Thank you volunteers! Council was also informed of other projects that may be beyond "volunteer" abilities and may be costly. The costly projects mentioned were blacktop repair and resurfacing (\$13,500 estimate). Also, cutting a large tree down in the prayer labyrinth. These projects need special tools and equipment to be completed safely and need to be finished in a timely manner.

Chris Becker reported on behalf of our financial task force and explained that they are still considering changing financial institutions and looking at options in which to restructure our HVAC debt. Council is confident that we have an excellent committee working on this difficult and fragile task.



## 2009 CHRISTMAS ADOPT-A-FAMILY PROGRAM

Yes, it is that time again, and we will have 18 needy families, 60 people, including 34 children for 2009. The Social Ministry Committee will provide an Aldi gift certificate for food, but we need your help again with gift shopping. Watch for a Christmas tag tree in the Narthex on **November 15** decorated with tags for each family member (**WHITE** for children, **GREEN** for adults). Tags will have information for you to shop for that person. Select the person or persons you would like to shop for and register your tags.

This involves putting your name and phone number on half the tag and leaving that half (with a star) with the person attending the tree. Coordinate your shopping with the coordinator listed on the tag. Your half of the tag and a separate gift tag must be attached to the outside of the wrapped gift. Shopping should be completed by **December 6**; delivery to families will be Saturday, **December 19**. Your help in shopping has been a huge success in past years.

New or used miscellaneous items listed below are needed as well as monetary contributions for food certificates and some gifts to be purchased by the Committee. Estimated cost is \$1,200. Place your monetary gift in your Special Christmas Adopt-A-Family envelope, or mark a pew envelope for Adopt-A-Family. Thrivent will provide matching funds.

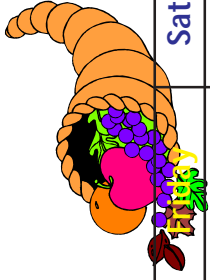

## HEALTH MINISTRY NEWS

**M**ark Twain once said, *"Kindness is a language which the deaf can hear and the blind can see."* Can you think of the gift that is always appreciated, and is free, but rewards the giver with great happiness and health? The gift of kindness provides all of this and more. Performing acts of kindness has been proven by scientific research to offer direct benefits of improved health and happiness to the giver and receiver. **November 15, 2009 is National Kindness Day.** Since 1996 The World Kindness Movement has been growing quickly, having been born out of a series of international conferences held in Japan. Each country that participated has formed its own national kindness organization. For the United States this organization is known as The Random Acts of Kindness Foundation. If someone walked up to you with a smile and several flowers would you think they were crazy? Or what if you saw someone drop a coin in your parking meter as you are rushing to feed it before it expired? These are just a couple examples of a random act of kindness. How do you commit a random act of kindness? Let some ideas roll through your mind. What is one small thing that you could do that would make anyone smile? A cup of coffee for the guy in the elevator?
