WORSHIP THEMES

Fourteenth Sunday after Pentecost (Sept. 2)

Who is welcome in your community of faith? And how would they know that they are? Today's readings ask us to think about hospitality, especially as it is practiced at the table. The feast of God's radical grace calls us into this place and connects friends and strangers with one another.

Fifteenth Sunday after Pentecost (Sept. 9)

In remembrance of baptism, many Christians make the sign of the cross. We are the people marked with Jesus' cross. But that cross is costly, and those who bear it must be prepared to let go of everything in order to take up the new life of the crucified and risen Christ.

Sixteenth Sunday after Pentecost (Sept. 16)

Only the lost can be found. The confession of sins is our admission that we do not know the way to God. But God has been looking for us. This day we are surrounded by images of people who "once were lost." Those who are found enter the joy of the Lord.

Seventeenth Sunday after Pentecost (Sept. 23)

Early in the academic year may seem a strange time to think about the final exam, but on this day Jesus reminds us that each of us needs to give an accounting of all that is entrusted to us. In the new logic of God's reign, knowing the riches of grace we possess demands resolute action from us; we risk it all for possessing the lavish love of God offered to us.

Council Update

Your Council has been hard at work:

- **INVESTING IN THE FUTURE**

The Council voted to raise the limit on the loan for the HVAC project from \$350K to \$500K, to cover both phases one and two of the project. The property committee anticipates that the second phase will be completed about January 2008.

If you have not contributed or pledged to the *'Investing in the Future Campaign'* to support this important HVAC project, please do so now, as your donation now can help keep the long term debt for this project to a more manageable level.

An informational meeting is planned for Sunday, September 16, 2007, after the second service, to update the congregation about the status of the HVAC project. (This is the first Sunday of resuming the 8:15 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. services.)

- **SPREAD GOD'S WORD**

Member Care Committee is being rolled into the Evangelism Committee, to be chaired by Council Member Jim Worley. With the help of Sharon Griffy's Adult Sunday Church School class, this committee has developed a three pronged focus of developing: Passion for God's Word, Passion for this Community of Faith, and Passion for Sharing Good News of God. New members welcome.

- **SHARE IN THE PEACE (CAMPERS AND COOKS NEEDED)**

Pastor's Message

This month, over the weekend of September 8 and 9, our community of faith will kickoff a multi-year ministry emphasis focused on ***"GOD'S PEACE FLOWING THROUGH US – IN OUR HEARTS, OUR HOMES, AND OUR WORLD"***. In Scripture, "peace" (*shalom* in Hebrew, *eirene* in Greek) is a gift of God, the intended state of creation which comes about when one is in a healthy relationship with God. During times of war, in which we presently find ourselves, the concept of peace is often dominated by images of the absence of strife between people. But God's peace encompasses so much more: it involves all of creation being in a right relationship with God and each part of creation. Only when all human beings are respected and treated with fairness and justice is God's peace present; only when everyone has "enough" of what is needed for life to be good and whole (food, shelter, clothing, health, loving family and friends) is God's peace experienced; only when all of creation is cared for can God's peace be a reality in the world. And that is God's will for the world. Likewise, when people do not have enough food/clothing/shelter, when relationships are broken as easily as dried twigs, when human life is devalued to the level of a commodity through pornography/drug trade/war, when "individual rights" supercede the good of the whole, when creation and society are reduced to a "throw away" mentality, when the fast pace of life relegates one's relationship with God as "optional" . . . then there is no peace. And that is not God's will for the world.

Please join me, not just on September 8 and 9, but everyday, in working to be God's

agents for peace: in our lives, in our homes/church/schools/workplaces/neighborhoods, and throughout the world. Be open to the Holy Spirit using you to make a positive difference in the life of someone else – this day and every day. Pray that God would help you be a blessing to those you meet each day. After all, as we've said many times in worship – it's why we are here!

Youth Group News



This month in conjunction with the church's Peace Focus Kick-off, the youth group will be hosting a **Fair Trade Fair**. What is that, you might be asking. While in Columbus at the Global Mission Event we learned a lot about efforts by Lutheran World Relief and other organizations to provide avenues for people in impoverished areas to become self sustaining. Fair Trade is one way that merchants and farmers are assured that they will be paid a fair price for their goods. We were really impressed and decided we wanted to help and to make others aware of the benefits of buying fair trade products.

The youth group has ordered a large variety of fair trade goods for your shopping pleasure. The items are all reasonably priced, we simply set them out, run the fair and send back what we don't sell. We are hoping to sell as much as we can on Sunday, September 9. There is a ten percent profit that goes to the youth group for mission work. The rest of the money goes back to the artists, craftsmen and farmers who produce the goods.

We will have a variety of wonderful things for you to choose from. Beautiful jewelry, scarves and handbags, delicious coffee, tea and chocolate (we sampled it in Columbus), musical instruments, hand thrown pottery, and numerous other one of a kind gifts will be available. Get an early start on your

Christmas shopping and be assured you will give a gift that will not be duplicated.

While in Columbus we learned a lot about the mission work that is being done in different parts of the world by the Lutheran church. We participated in multi-cultural worship experiences and heard inspiring speakers. The event that probably had the most impact on all of us was hearing Immaculate Ilibegiza about her harrowing experiences in Rwanda. We are hoping to bring her here to speak so that you can all hear her uplifting and moving message about faith.

What else have we been up to? Well, in August we held a successful lock-in with higher attendance than we have had in a while. We also met for our Second Sunday lunch and planning meeting, and we purchased and delivered back to school supplies for eleven families. We took a trip to Dublin (Ohio, that is) for the Celtic Festival which was hot, but lots of fun. Several of us have been participating in the evening Spiritual Journeys group. If you are a night person who has a hard time getting up for Sunday morning service, or you are looking for a smaller more personal faith experience come check it out. This is a fun group of mostly young people who are enjoying learning and worship together.

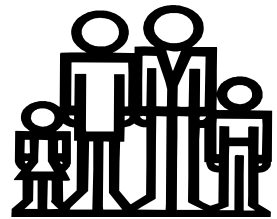

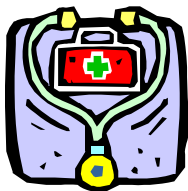

HEALTH MINISTRY NEWS

Hand Washing plays a major role in preventing the spread of diseases. Washing your hands regularly with soap and water can protect you from many illnesses caused by viruses and bacteria. Washing removes germs you pick up when you touch people, animals or surfaces. If not removed, these germs may get into your eyes, nose or mouth and cause illness.

Can't See Germs

Germs hide on remote controls, door handles, keyboards, faucet handles and any surface people touch. Since we can never be sure what germs are on our hands, washing them regularly and thoroughly with soap and water is a very important safeguard against infectious disease.

When to Wash

Wash your hands as frequently as you can; it is essential to wash your hands at these special times:

- * Before touching any food or eating
- * After using the bathroom
- * After handling animals or animal wastes

How to Wash

- * Wet your hands with clean water
- * Apply soap
- * Rub your hands together vigorously and scrub all surfaces
- * Scrub for 20 seconds (sing Happy Birthday twice)
- * Rinse with clean water
- * Dry hands briskly
