## Pastor's Message

"REFORM" ... It is a word we are hearing often these days. In the vernacular, it means "to change". But that is often too simplistic, because it literally means to reshape, to alter the form of something, thereby giving new life to it. Long before it was a word in our society's vocabulary, it was and is God's word, for the message of Scripture is all about reform. And, it is a descriptor for us who are part of the Lutheran Church. Officially, Lutherans are not considered to be part of a "denomination"; we are participants in a "movement", which denotes fluidity, changing shape, going in a certain direction, not standing still. The concept of movement as applied to us Lutherans has to do with our understanding that life is ever changing, and as such, we need a faith and a Church that is not static, but re-shaping, re-forming, growing. To that end, the congregation council of Lutheran Church of Our Savior determined at the conclusion of last year that it was, once again, time to engage in **strategic planning** for our community of faith. The purpose of this monthly exercise is to present to you

at our February, 2010 annual meeting goals, strategies and objectives for congregational ministry for the next five years. But long before we can look at goals, we've had to determine who we are as a congregation (mission), how we believe God wants us to live out our identity (vision), what we stand for (core values). In revisiting those three concepts, our guiding principle has been the understanding that this is God's church of which we are a part, and this is God's

## WORSHIP THEMES

### *September 6, Fourteenth Sunday after Pentecost*

James tells us to stop showing favoritism in the assembly, treating the rich visitor with more honor than the poor one. Jesus himself seems to show partiality in his first response to the Syrophenician woman in today's gospel. Was he testing her faith in saying Gentiles don't deserve the goods meant for God's children? Or was he speaking out of his human worldview, but transcended those limits when she took him by surprise with her reply? Either way, the story tells us that God shows no partiality. Everyone who brings her or his need to Jesus is received with equal honor as a child and heir.

### *September 13, Fifteenth Sunday after Pentecost*

Three weeks ago we heard John's gospel's version of Peter's confession of faith. This week we hear Mark's version, when Peter says, "You are the Messiah." In John, the stumbling block is Jesus' invitation to eat his flesh, given for the life of the world. In Mark too the scandal has to do with Jesus'

words about his own coming death, and here Peter himself stumbles over Jesus' words. But Jesus is anointed (the meaning of "messiah") in Mark only on the way to the cross (14:3); so we are anointed in baptism with the sign of the cross.

### *September 20, Sixteenth Sunday after Pentecost*

Today we hear James warn against selfish ambition, while the disciples quarrel over which one of them is the greatest. Jesus tells them the way to be great is to serve. Then, to make it concrete, he puts in front of them an actual flesh-and-blood child. We are called to welcome the particular children God puts in front of us, to make room for them in daily interaction, and to give them a place of honor in the assembly.

### *September 27, Seventeenth Sunday after Pentecost*

Someone is casting out demons in Jesus' name who isn't part of Jesus' own circle, and the disciples want him stopped. They appeal to Jesus, as Joshua did to Moses about the elders who prophesied without official authorization. Like Moses, Jesus refuses to see this as a threat. Jesus welcomes good being done in his name, even when it is not under his control. The circle we form around Jesus' word must be able to value good being done in ways we wouldn't do it, by people we can't keep tabs on.

## Council Update

Our meeting was called to order, and Pastor Eichhorn led a discussion on chapter seven, the final chapter in *The Corporate Person*. Pastor Eichhorn then gave the opening prayer and our meeting continued. We approved July minutes after minor corrections and additions. Our Financial Secretary, Don Anstaett, reviewed his report and noted that we are running a \$23,000 deficit so far this year and our congregational giving is down \$16,000 YTD. The good news is that our expenses have decreased compared to last year. Don Hartman gave his treasurers' report and explained how Fifth-Third Bank made a money transfer mistake which caused the church to send out a few bad checks. The council agreed that this is unacceptable and we are working on this matter. We are also looking into options of moving our funds to a different banking institution. We will, of course, keep the church informed. Our Strategic Planning group has changed our mission statement. The council would appreciate any questions or comments on the mission statement change. We are now working on a new vision statement. Our Property Committee is searching for a new chairman. Steve Harper is our spokesperson for this committee and will be happy to speak with anyone interested. Also, there is a list of projects (small and large) in which we are asking for church volunteers to help us accomplish these tasks. Thank you, and we will see you at church.

ministry in which we've been called to participate. We began by taking an extensive inventory of all the ministry activities we currently offer to determine what is important to us, and took note of what were missing that we felt were needed. From this exhaustive exercise, we crafted a set of core values, those things for which, by our ministries, we are willing to "go to the mat for", those things which define us as a community of faith, and with the elimination of one or more would cause us to cease to exist. We see the core values of LCOS as:

- 1. This is God's Church and God's mission, based on the Bible as God's Word.*
- 2. Collective worship of God as a Community of faith is essential to our life, individually and with one another.*
- 3. All persons are gifted by the Holy Spirit and are called to share their best gifts in ministry; lay leadership is key to our planned and intentional ministry.*
- 4. Outreach and hospitality are vital to this community of faith.*

We then set our sights on revisiting our mission statement. Succinctly, a mission statement explains why we exist, and should be short enough for every member to know and share with those outside our doors. Again, relying on the guidance of the Holy Spirit, we see the mission of LCOS as:

- + Share God's Word**
- + Serve Community**
- + Grow in Faith**

Currently, we are working on a strategic Vision Statement, designed to help us determine how God wants us to live out the

above mission. One of the benchmarks we used for this process was to ask, "in 2014 (5 years from now), what does LCOS look like?" We also looked at this from the standpoint of relevancy – how can what we do and who we are be relevant in the lives of our members and the community at large? A first draft of this statement was completed in August, which reads,

*"We are a growing, diverse congregation actively sharing God's blessings in the world community."*

We define "diverse" in terms of size (numbers), ethnicity, programming, age, religious backgrounds, economic backgrounds, etc.

As we move through this process, the council invites your feedback. Equally important, the council asks for your prayers, your continued participation in ministry, and your willingness to grow in faith where God has "planted you" – here in this place we call Lutheran Church of Our Savior.
